round at the April Meeting and an opportunity for you to indicate if you are one of these people. We hope to remedy this situation for the May newsletter and beyond.


<u>Group News</u> – the Bridge Group are still looking for new members and Book Group 3 has space for one new member.

Japan trip – eight of us from u3a embarked on a 17 day trip to South Korea and the Japanese islands recently. We took with us the rainfall that has been such a feature of our

Winter and Spring in Edenbridge and had many days exploring in the rain under umbrellas and plastic ponchos. Winter has been quite harsh in Japan this year and although our tour was called 'the Blossom Tour' we were too early this year to see the cherry blossom at its best!

However, we were lucky as we sailed towards Tokyo – a clear evening and mount Fuji came into view. Quite some volcano that stands 3,776.24 metres above sea level (some 12,389 feet 3 inches in old money!) and, being the tallest mountain in Japan, towers over all the other hills around. It is found on the island of Honshu and is considered a sacred mountain in





Japan – it last erupted some 320 years ago!



One thing we didn't see were any potholes on the roads in Japan – the transport network, both road and rail, puts us to shame.

The rail network is extensive with the option of local trains or the bullet. The bullet train for us was a trip to remember - accelerating to around 300 kilometres per hour (188 mph in our terms) and journeys timed to the second in Japan. (At that Speed Edenbridge to London

Bridge would take just 10 minutes but unfortunately Southern's rail network is too bendy!)

Room service in our Tokyo hotel was very much 21st Century.
